Children will learn about life at the time of the First World War. They will spend time in a classroom, visit houses, shops and see transport of the times. They will learn about working conditions down the mines and visit a pit. <p>October</p>	<p>Crucial Crew</p> <p>Class 4 will visit Crucial Crew which is a multi-agency event supported by the Fire Service, the Police, the Ambulance Service, Her Majesty's Prison Service, Victim Support, Drugs awareness, School Nurses and the National Trust. They aim to raise awareness of safety issues to school children in Year 6 (aged 10-11).</p> <p>The events take the form of interactive scenarios. They will collect apples from the trees in the school grounds and make Apple Crumble. They celebrate Harvest with parents in a shared act of Collective Worship in school.</p> <p>After the harvest children sell their Homemade produce and the donations of food brought to school.</p> <p>The funds raised will be donated to Wonder Years Centre of Excellence (WYCE) in Gambia and donations of tinned and packet food to the King's Church Food Bank in Darlington.</p> <p>WYCE have established a nursery and lower basic school educating approximately 400 children aged from three to twelve, in addition to providing a primary health care clinic. Help children and young people understand how important it is that every child feels valued and included in school, able to be themselves, without fear of bullying





Encourage parents and carers to work with their school and talk to their children about bullying, difference and equality

In addition, its Library contains three copies of the Magna Carta. <p>July</p>	<p>Eucharist</p> <p>We will celebrate the Eucharist or Holy Communion. The Eucharist is the re-enactment of the Last Supper, the final meal that Jesus Christ shared with his disciples before his arrest, and eventual crucifixion. At the meal Jesus ate bread and wine and instructed his disciples to do the same in memory of him.</p> <p>The children’s prayers, hymns and readings in a Eucharist service remind those taking part of that final meal.</p> <p>Communion is offered to staff, parents and visitors. The people taking part drink a sip of wine and eat a tiny piece of some form of bread, both of which have been consecrated.</p>	<p>Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To understand the importance of the sacrament of Eucharist in the Christian faith
